Students will develop expertise to:

- Recognize the major events in the development of modern day photography
- Recognize composition principles and their impact on photography
- Recognize and apply ethical and legal standards to all aspects of photo journalism
- Recognize the impact of electronic technology and future trends in digital imaging on the traditional field of photo journalism
- Comprehend the features of consumer- and professional-level digital cameras, file modes (such as GIF and JPEG) and storage media
- Understand the use of digital camera controls, including aperture- and shutter-priority, white balance and flash
- Use a camera to tell stories, capture people

and nature and/or create documentaries

- Organize images based on keywords and evaluative criteria
- Improve images through cropping, sizing, white-balance adjustment, color correction, highlight and shadow alteration, sharpening and noise reduction using a variety of in-camera and post-camera techniques

Participation: Active participation is mandatory to success in this class, and students are expected to be attentive and engaged. Active participation is measured by attendance, punctuality, preparation, contributions and cooperation, and ***turning in projects by deadline is paramount.***

Many opportunities will be presented during class to study print journalism, brainstorm and research story ideas, edit photos and produce projects. However, ***time outside of class will be expected to be successful.***

Classroom Rules:

- Learn and use AP style
- Meet or exceed all deadlines
- Be courteous to the instructor and fellow students
- Opposing points of view are welcomed in this class, and class discussions are welcome
- Be prepared to stand up and speak in front of this class - often

Academic Dishonesty and Plagiarism: Academic dishonesty will not be tolerated. Students are required to submit their own work. Any student caught plagiarizing photos, quotations, headlines or captions from outside sources or will receive a grade of 0 for that assignment.

Extra Credit: Photo Journalism students will have an opportunity each week to earn a ticket redeemable for five extra points on a daily grade with the *Scoop Score* quizzes. Occasionally *Scoop Score* tickets will be redeemable for extra points on major grades as well. *Scoop Score* tickets may not be redeemed if a student has any missing assignments.

Technology Usage: Students are expected to be responsible for school-owned equipment that may be used in this class including digital cameras, lenses, batteries, scanners, camera bags, video cameras, microphones, tripods, lighting, computers (desk top and laptop), and software. Digital cameras are valued at more than \$1,000; lenses are valued at \$450-\$1,000; video cameras are valued at \$2,200; laptops are valued at \$1,400-\$2,700. Camera and computer repairs start at \$300, minimum. Insurance is not provided to cover any of these costs; students are completely financially responsible for journalism equipment. *Students will be required to pay the full replacement cost for lost, stolen or damaged equipment while it is in their care.*
