AP Spanish V Literature and Culture

Course Overview

The AP Spanish Literature course is equivalent to a third-year college course in Peninsular and Latin American Literature. The course is conducted entirely in Spanish and covers Spanish and Latin American authors, and their works, from the medieval period to the present day. The works are presented in chronological order with the aim of integrating the historical themes and literary movements of the different time periods. The course is structured to allow students to complete the entire AP Spanish Literature reading list, published in the AP Course Description, using original, unabridged versions in one year. The main text selected is *Azulejo*, *Anthology to the AP Spanish and Literature and Culture Course*. The course teaches students the techniques of literary analysis and a basic vocabulary of critical terms. The two-semester course and its activities are intended to teach and enhance a student's ability to acquire, identify, understand, discuss, interpret and analyze the form and content of literary works of prose, poetry and drama along with the literary terms and conceptual aspects of art and history of the time. The lessons are designed to help students interpret the figures of speech, tone, genre, style, characters, themes and literary symbols in an effort to develop their analytical and interpretative skills.

Course Objective

The objectives of this course are to:

Foster students' appreciation for the richness of the Spanish language and Hispanic literature and culture.

Provide opportunities for students to use the three modes of communication in the process of learning how to analyze a literary text.

Provide opportunities for student reflection on the relationship of a reading selection to its artistic, historical, social, and cultural contexts.

Students will:

- Acquire the appropriate vocabulary and terminology to analyze and discuss a literary selection
- Engage in analyzing critically the form and content of literary works using the appropriate terms and tools to engage in literary analysis, and responding through integrated writing and speaking activities
- Examine and analyze the main ideas, themes and principal characters of text written by required authors.

- Recognize characteristic features of an author's style in literature written by required authors
- Write focused, organized essays that analyze how a given theme is treated in one particular poem or prose work.
- Write essays comparing how a theme is treated in two or more works from the required reading list.
- Write essays analyzing critical commentary about a particular work from the require reading list
- Gain an understanding of historical, cultural and literary background relevant to the works

As a result, the students will be prepared to take the AP Spanish Literature and Culture Exam on May 9, 2017.

Activities

A variety of activities are provided to enable the students to incorporate the four language skills in order to synthesize authentic materials.

After establishing the essential questions and readings, the students are presented with activities, quizzes, and tests that link the literary works and the six AP themes and a variety of the sub-themes. In addition to timed essays written in class, students are assigned essay prompts similar to those of the AP Spanish Literature Exam. These essays consist of: Poetry Analysis, Thematic Analysis (analysis, compare and contrast) and Text Analysis (short answers to open ended questions, analysis of critical commentary). Student responses are weighted for organization, content, historical connections, analysis and language usage, following the AP scoring guidelines. Students need to master not only the literary terms and rhetorical devices, but also make explicit connections between the devices and the overall themes represented. Emphasis will be placed on the integration of the author's use of devices and the overarching message he/she intends to convey through the rich vocabulary in the texts and its context.

COURSE EVALUATION

Grades will be based on the student's performance on all activities in the course. This includes, but is not limited to classwork, essays, reading comprehension activities, text analysis and comparisons, quizzes, tests, projects, formal writing assessments, formal class participation and homework. Students will be given significant written/and or oral feedback on all their work. Feedback and evaluation will be guided by the use of the most recent rubrics from AP Central's web site, which will be provided to each student at the beginning of the course. Students will also receive a grade for the quality, quantity and enthusiasm of their class participation.

Grading Scales:

B = 80-89

C = 70-79

F = 69 and below

Based on the above listed class activities, the following weights will be assigned:

50% for major grades – At least 3 per nine week period.

50% for daily grades – At least 6 per nine week period.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS

Assignments: Assignments must be turned in at the beginning of the class on the day they are due. If they are not turned in when they are due, then they will be considered late and will follow FBISD's late policy. In case of extenuating circumstances and more time is needed to complete the assigned work, the student must discuss his or her needs with the instructor prior to the due date. ALL assignments in Spanish V will be completed in Spanish!

It is the responsibility of the student to get any work missed due to an absence. Due to the intensive nature of the AP Spanish Literature and Culture course, attendance is essential for success.

Late work: Daily and Major grades will be accepted late with a penalty of 15 points per day for up to 3 days (maximum grade of 85%), WITH THE EXCEPTION OF GROUP OR INTERPERSONAL ASSESSMENTS. If work is late more than 3 days, students will receive a zero.

Retesting: Retesting is allowed only for <u>major grade assessments</u> (NOT projects and presentations, six weeks tests, semester exams or daily grades) if the grade earned is below 75%. Attendance in tutorials is required prior to retesting, and the maximum allowable grade on a re-test is a 75%. **THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS TO THIS POLICY!**

Make-up work procedures, absences and tardies: Students must check in the teacher's Schoology page for a copy and instructions of all assignments missed. It will be the student's responsibility to look up the assignments when absent and to ask a classmate for any written notes.

Students will get 24 hours for every day missed to make up daily assignment and assessments if they are absent. For long term absences, the student must meet with the instructor as they will be dealt with on an individual basis.

The entire class period will be used for practicing the target language, so that the instructor can observe the students, answer questions and make corrections. In-class assignments can be in either written or oral form or a combination of both. Therefore, students should write legibly and put forth all their effort, as the instructor reserves the right to collect and grade any work done during the class period. Should a student be absent when an in-class assignment is collected and graded, the student will have the opportunity to make up the assignment. Students will get 24 hours for every day missed to make up the missed in-class assignment if they are absent. For long term absences, the student must meet with the instructor as they will be dealt with on an individual basis.

Do not be tardy! Tardies will be administered according to the policy stated in the student handbook.

Work assigned prior to an absence will be due on the first return day, including tests and projects. NO EXCEPTIONS!

Tutorials: Tutorials are not meant to replace valuable classroom instruction. In other words, tutorials are only an option for students who have been paying attention and participating in class. The student needs to come prepared with his/her materials and with specific questions to ask.

Academic Honesty: The student will be expected to do his/her own work at all times. This means no copying work from public or private sources or using another individual's work, or presenting another individual's work as their own. **The students may NOT use translation services or programs**. All of these constitute acts of dishonesty and will be considered plagiarism. No credit will be awarded for plagiarized work. Students caught plagiarizing will be subjected to the consequences specified in the school handbook's academic honesty policy.

The Spanish Portfolio All students will be expected to turn in a FINAL AP SPANISH V PORTFOLIO at the end of the year, for their final Major Grade of the year. The Spanish Portfolio will be turned in prior to the AP exam in May, upon the completion of reading all 38 Literary Pieces. This Portfolio will include all pertinent information pertaining to the class and AP exam. Each student will be responsible for building their portfolio with all material provided for each of the 38 readings. Each reading in the Portfolio must be labeled using a tab. It will be the responsibility of each student to make sure they are completing their Portfolios throughout the year.
