AP ART HISTORY Ms. Pham

Course Description

This course is open to only juniors and seniors. It is a rigorous college level course designed to explore and analyze architecture, sculpture, painting, and the minor arts as they relate to styles and cultures from ancient times to the present. Through readings, research, slides, videos, presentations and projects, students will view significant artworks from around the world. Writing skills will be important in the description, analysis, and comparison of these works. Students are encouraged to keep a notebook to record class discussion on significant historical events, art periods/styles, specific artworks, and issues/themes that connect these artworks. This course will be structured around the big ideas and essential questions of the AP Art History Course and Exam Description. All content meets the requirements as stated in the AP art history exam brochure and website. An AP student's commitment goes beyond the normal school day, and requires students to work diligently outside of school as well. If the student successfully passes the College Board AP art history exam, the student will earn fine art college credit for this course.

Course Objective

- Students will acquire a fundamental art vocabulary.
- Students will understand the purpose and function of art.
- Students will develop skills in identifying, describing, interpreting, and analyzing works of art based on periods/styles and themes.
- Students will practice the essential skills of visual, contextual and comparative analysis in both verbal and written forms.
- Students will develop an in-depth understanding of individual works of art from diverse cultures.
- Students will cultivate an appreciation for all styles of art and relate works of art to their proper cultural and historical origins by examining issues such as politics, religion, patronage, gender, function, and ethnicity.

Course Outline

During the first week of school, the course is outlined to the students. The percentages of course coverage of the exam – Global Prehistory, Ancient Mediterranean, Early Europe and Colonial Americas, Later Europe and Americas, Indigenous Americas, Africa, West and Central Asia, South, East and Southeast Asia, The Pacific, and Global Contemporary to Present – are discussed in detail.

Attendance Policy

Grading Policy

Students will earn at least 1 major grade per 3-week period for the major tests, projects, essays or presentations completed. At least 11 daily grades will be accumulated throughout the nine weeks from classroom participation, (pop) quizzes, homework, and class assignments.

Turning in homework late will result in a 30-point deduction the first day and 10-point deduction for the next two. After the 3rd day, students will automatically receive a 0.

Classroom Rules

- Be on time with supplies accessible and ready to work.
- Respect your materials, classmates and teacher.
- Students must sit at their assigned seats every day and stay seated until the bell rings.
- Turn in your homework on time or points will be deducted.
- NO food or drinks.

- <u>PARTICIPATION</u> will be graded!! (Ex: Stay on task, follow directions, CLEAN workspace before leaving class, etc.) I will be documenting on your participation every day.

AP Exam

All components of the course must be completed to receive credit for the course on the high school transcript. All students must take both the Fall Semester exam in December and the AP Art History Exam in May 2019. The Fall semester exam is mandatory and may not be exempt. Information about test fees, collection dates, and registration details will be available soon.

Field Trip

In second semester, the students will be going to the Museum of Fine Arts on Thursday. The fee will be approximately \$10 and they will need to bring their own money for lunch or sack lunch.

Extra Credit

Students may earn extra credit for each nine week by completing the following:
-attend any art museum (except MFAH) in Houston or another art related activity. The student must turn in a typed or written long paragraph report about an artwork that interests you with a picture of yourself

with your favorite artwork.

End of the Year Art Show - Ridge Point Perspective

Students will be expected to participate in end of the year art show to display their portfolio of work from the year. The student will be responsible for setting up and taking down their display space with their artwork on the day of the show, May $10^{\rm th}$. This will be a major grade for attending and students unable to attend the art show will have an alternative assignment.
