Joining the meeting as an attendee/parent – Part 1

- Once the user clicks on the **Join Microsoft Teams Meeting** link in the meeting invite it will open a browser window or tab.
- If the user on the other end of the invite has Microsoft Teams install then they can open the application, if not they can click the **Join on the web instead** button.

Joining the meeting as an attendee/parent – Part 2

• Once clicked, the below screen will be presented to the attendee, where they simply type their name in and click the **Join now** button.



They will then be sent to the Lobby awaiting you to let them in.



A bit lonely? – the attendee/parent will need to wait until they are let into the meeting



• Once admitted the attendee/parent will join the meeting (as seen below)

Daniel has now joined the meeting and Megan is there waiting (the organizer)

What about chat / conversations and file sharing?

Even though you may not use Microsoft Teams in your organization, the ability to chat via the chat functionality of Teams as well as SHARE files is there and available.

The 2 images below show an external user(you) beginning a conversation with the meeting organizer (Megan in this case) and the other shows the meeting organizer (Megan), adding a file to the meeting for all to review.

Using the chat window a Microsoft Teams user can send / share a file to the other participants



The external participant, let's call them the non Teams user, can still interact with the document !!!
