Using the FBEF grant, I provided purpose to an unused space. This area had no purpose, so I renovated the space to be open and safe for students post COVID 19.


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SAFE SPACE & ADVOCACY

Taught a multitude of lessons on media and technology use. Students set up passwords, learned about Office 365, set up email signatures for future success.



This graph shows the overall growth Dulles HS Library has had regarding circulation. This has happened by making the library a more integral part of the school and updating the collection through weeding and strategic collection development.

Books circulation doubled from the previous years (2018-2019); Circulation did drop during 2021 due to regulations on physical check out



engagement; and better marketing.


IOTH GRADE

English IV classes and science classes really took advantage of research lessons; Collaboration with CCRA




LIBRARY LOCK IN

FBEF FUNDING

District Funds The 5k provided by Fort Bend Education Foundation allowed to purchase board game items, furniture for storage, Keurigs for a selfserve coffee bar, and seating. This created a safe space for students to socialize and problem solve.

ACTIVITY FUNDING & FUNDRAISERS

Activity funds are raised to purchase and replace library materials and provide programming options •for students. We also led a few fundraisers, including t-shirt design contest, book fair, and coffee sales.

REIMAGINE THE SPACE

With a fresh coat of paint, we made the space more vibrant and welcoming. Bright red cubbies help with organizing games for student and staff use. **STEP ONE**

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Gave multiple presentations (campus, district, and state wide) to teachers and librarians on the uses of board games in the library.



AWARENESS

During Library Orientations and our yearly FISH camp, Ms. Carpenter presented to all freshman students about new programs and services available.

STEP FOUR



IN ACTION

With nearly 5k visits a month, nearly 20-30% of those visits were to the board game café. Board games are checked out for home use and used in library, 1.5k circulations.

COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT



Collection development is based on reflecting the demographics of the school and needs of students. Each book purchased is selected by the librarian and has multiple positive reviews from professional peer reviewed journals to be put on the shelf.

PURCHASING FOCUS

The collection development has been focused on newer materials that represent different perspectives; focusing on BIPOC, AAPI, and LGBTOIA+ representation. Fiction genres that have been popular and therefore need cultivation are Fantasy and Thriller.



RECRUITMENT Recruited DHS Staff and faculty to help with staging areas, lighting, and volunteering.




