

Summary

Introduction:

Fort Bend ISD tasked Cooperative Strategies with facilitation of Facilities Master Planning Steering Committee. The committee developed a series of facilities options which were intended to generated discussion and feedback within the community.

The options were presented to the Board of Trustees on March 26, 2018. On April 3, Options materials along with an online survey were also posted to the website to begin to collect feedback.

FBISD hosted four public community meetings during the first 2 weeks of April to present the options and solicit discussion and feedback within the community. At each meeting, participants had an opportunity to fill out the online survey as well as provide additional "Parking Lot" ideas for the committee members to consider as they work towards developing a recommendation for District Leadership.

The intent of this report is to capture high level sentiment that is prevalent throughout the responses. Some open ended comments have been combined or summarized to ensure that all themes were captured. The unabridged responses can be found in the full response report (1,200+ pages).

Online Survey Responses

The survey closed at 5:00 pm on Monday 4/16, the survey collected over 21,593 responses.

It is clear that there were organized efforts to attempt to flood the survey with duplicate responses. Over 5,444 responses were collected from three IP addresses and all responses were identical and submitted less than 3 minutes apart overnight. This indicates that some type of automated script may have been utilized. It was also evident that organized social media campaigns were also conducted, in many cases, instructions for how to answer the survey were mistakenly pasted into the survey.

The complete report of all responses including duplicates is available and is over 1,200 pages. This report is intended to provide a summary of responses. Due to the flood of duplicate responses, results to questions about the support of options have are shown in two ways:

- 1: IP addresses that submitted 5 or less surveys.
2. All respondents regardless of number of response from the same IP.

It should be noted that this engagement process is intended to collect feedback and generate ideas and that all ideas are given equal weight.

In many cases respondents did not put their responses in proper question, therefore some comments or ideas were moved to the appropriate section of the report. Comments pulled directly from the survey have not been corrected for spelling or grammatical errors.

New ideas collected after April 12 are in red.



HS Option 1:

- Consider a rezoning process to balance enrollment between Ridge Point, Hightower, Willowridge, and Marshall high schools.

Range of Comments

- Like the idea or rezoning students into Marshall and Willowridge to increase enrollment.
- All of sienna should be zoned to ridge point We bought houses and pay higher taxes so our kids could go to rphs and not be cheated on the way.
- I already pay the highest taxes in sienna Plantation as my house is one of the most expensive according to tax records. I DONT WANT MY TAXES TO INCREASE!!!! My daughter is going to graduate from Ridgepoint 2021. I will send her to a private school before she is forced to attend Hightower!!!! Unacceptable!!!!
- Keep Sienna kids in Sienna!
- Keep academy programs status quo.
- New Territory should not be split between Austin and Travis.
- Completely opposed. Families move to Sienna (and pay high taxes to do so) in order for their children to grow up together, play sports in and out of school together, and to ultimately go thru school and graduate together. I do not live in Sienna to leave Sienna for high school.
- Does not address growth of Sienna - we need more facilities on the south side of Highway 6. Respect highway 6 as a natural boundary.
- I do not hear good things about Marshall, Willowridge and hightower. I pay way too many taxes living in Riverstone to have my child's educational options be devalued.
- feel that every school that is in this district serves a purpose. Whether it be to a community, the students, the district itself or anyone else. I feel that no school should be taken from any community. As a district and multiple communities within this district we should be able to pull together and make things work for the sake of our students and families as well as the staff. Stop building schools in specific areas to only benefit a group of people. On top of that, stop building the schools so small in areas that may be over populated so that you won't have an excuse to build another within a year or two.

Additional Ideas (from the Parking Lots)

- Consider including Elkins in the rezoning. Elkins areas North of 6 should feed into Marshall, then Rezone Hightower between Elkins and Hightower.
- Consider rezoning Telfair to either Austin or Kempner so that parts of Riverstone can go to Clements.
- Consider allowing open enrollment into Marshall from all other schools.
- Build another high school and stop wasting the community's time. Sienna is a master planned community so I have a hard time being sympathetic when Johnson Development & the city knew the population of Sienna would eclipse Missouri City.
- Consider rezoning all non-sienna residents out of Ridge Point into Hightower (FM-521, TX-6)
- Consider zoning all of Madden to Austin to fix the feeder.
- Rezone Alaina to Travis and Brazos Bend to Austin. Keep New Territory community United.
- Open enrollment between RPHS and HHS where parents can choose between both campuses. Maybe some parents in Sienna won't mind sending their students to HHS. Also offer special programs at Hightower as incentive for parents to send students to HHS.
- Consider using University of Houston - Fort Bend facility to relieve Clements and Fort Settlement
- Consider open enrollment to Marshall.
- Overflow students from over-utilized schools to Marshall, Hightower, and Willowridge.
- Consider shift system at Ridgepoint. 6:30 to 12:30 and 1:30 to 7:30.
- Why not Decommission parts of willowridge and marshall.

- This action alone is likely not enough to completely relieve Ridge Point.


Range of Comments

- Keep academy programs status quo.
- I don't think the decisions made will be fair due to the schools in question not having as much parental support as Ridge Point does.
- Again, I concern about the quality of teachers draw to this early college. Location wise, Marshall is better than Hightower. But do we have more location options?
- Do you really think kids what to be bussed from one side of the district to the other?? And didn't we just try to save \$1 million by changing the start times to save money on bussing???
- Does not address capacity in Sienna.
- I don't support that Marshall becomes an academy so just keep it as it is.
- I think pre college will not attract any students and will not solve the problems.
- If you remove all of the academies from their current schools won't that effect the standards and performance scores on these campuses?
- Marshall is in an economically disadvantaged part of town, not the best area for academy. Hightower would be better choice.
- Marshall is in good condition so it should be utilized. It makes sense to have all of the academies in one place rather than scattered throughout the district.
- That would create a situation where you put all Black and Brown students (Marshall and Willowridge) into the most Antiquated Building in the District. This would create a form of economic segregation and not prepare those students to be successful in the real world. If you are combining both schools it would be best served on Marshall's campus because it is a more modern facility.

Additional Ideas (from the Parking Lots)

- Consider moving all academies to Marshall while the current students are in place, there is room.
- Combine Marshall and Willowridge at Marshall, use Willowridge as an Early College or Academy High School or CTE.
- Set up new academies that would attract students to schools in need of student growth such as Marshall.
- Build another high school in the Ridge Point attendance zone.
- Make a GT high school / early college prep HS.
- Move math and science academy to Marshall. Rezone Dulles into Elkins and rezone Elkins into Ridge Point
- Convert Marshall to a dedicated Early Education Center however leave all academies in place at the current schools.
- Allow students from all over the district to apply for acceptance into any school in the district. That will allow spaces to be made available at each school. Also, each school should have a particular magnet or academy. That will allow students to free up spaces in their zoned schools.
- Each high school should have 1 to 2 academies available for students. If you are going to house a dedicated early college center you should have a location centrally located within the district.
- There shouldn't be any academies at schools that are not underutilized. For example, there should not be an academy at Elkins since Elkins is in an area that is experiencing growth. Instead of focusing only on "early college" programs, also provide technical, non-college prep programs at Marshall. This will attract more students to Marshall and will also provide a much needed service to students.




Range of Comments

- Keep academy programs status quo.
- Any program should benefit all students within FBISD. This option only focuses on alleviating a problem within the Ridge Point campus. The root cause is capacity.
- I think it's a good idea to have all the academies together.
- Hightower's enrollment is fine and the building is in good shape. Do not redone our kids from Hightower.
- Just as I feel passionate for Marshall, I'm sure just the same could be said for those that attend Hightower. They wouldn't want to see there school closed down just as much as we wouldn't.
- This idea may work but will affect those currently zoned, to, Hightower. Kids currently zoned, to Hightower should still have first choice.
- Do not want Hightower kids rezoned. I want my child to remain at Hightower.
- This is not okay. Stop taking away from people and just make it fair. Rezoning is the best option.
- You still need to build capacity at Ridge Point and stop the shuffling games.
- Doesn't help with sienna overcrowding issue
- This essentially "closes" Hightower High School to the general community. Communities tend to thrive around its high schools. I would rather not completely dismantle that relationship.
- Students will be on the road for over an hour to get to school. Unnecessary.

Additional Ideas (from the Parking Lots)

- Increase Sienna taxes and build them a new high school with their increased taxes or feed Baines and other middle school in Sienna to 3 feeder patterns, Ridgepoint, Hightower and Elkins. Send Willowridge students to Marshall or vice versa. Renovate Willowridge to make Academy only school, high school for college school or use Marshall. Both have low enrollment. Hightower has constructed homes in the zone area near Fort Bend Toll and Trammel Fresno area. Willowridge and Marshall have no new home construction in their areas and enrollment will continue to decline. So merge Marshall and Willowridge.
- Build another Hs in sienna.
- If all academies in one school doesn't work, consider having academies split into two schools so school is roughly half academy and half zoned population. Maybe one on each side of the district.
- Consider Lake O Middle School as an early college or academy high school, build a new MS for Hightower.
- Invest in Hightower HS to make it equal to Dulles or Clements, and then rezoning students to this school will not be a problem, whether it is a college center or a regular high school.
- Move Heritage Rose out of the Ridgepoint feeder pattern coupled with option 2 or 3.

Range of Comments

- Expand Commonwealth to the point where rezoning is not necessary.
- We strongly oppose any rezoning to balance enrollment. Instead, we strongly support increase in permanent capacity to Commonwealth Elementary by adding a permanent structure replacing the temporary portables. - We suggest a permanent capacity of approximately 1000+ students. Current enrollment of approx. 940 confirms that efficient scheduling of common areas is already in place in CWE.
- Rezoning to balance enrollment is ok.
- ABSOLUTELY DO NOT SUPPORT!!!! I will sell my residence because of it. I moved to be near Colony Meadows so my child would attend Fort Settlement. I will plan on perusing legal action if there is a change.
- Adding more class room make school more crowded and can degrade the quality of the school, cause traffic nightmare to communities.
- I am against extending the current CWE building because it will make the outside playground too small and the school too crowded.
- I propose zoning Avalon at Riverstone to Ann Sullivan elementary school to reduce CWE utilization.

- Better zoning and schools considering the taxes that are being paid for Riverstone.
- Commonwealth has been overcrowded and it is impacting the quality of education.
- The District should build the schools before the developers build the houses.
- The District should stop development if there are not schools in place to serve the proposed development.
- I do like the current plan. It make sense based on the number of students going to the school.
- We strongly support spending tax dollars renovating Austin Parkway Elementary and Settlers Way Elementary to bring them up to the prevailing FBISD standards for attracting more students because these two schools will be under-utilized in 5 years. In addition, these two schools are traditional flagship schools in FBISD.

Additional Ideas (from the Parking Lots)

- Trying to find land of an additional elementary school in the area.
- Zone or overflow new residents to schools that have capacity, LAST IN FIRST OUT.
- Consider leasing space near new development to accommodate growth, allow exiting students to maintain current zoning.
- Build a new school for new communities as promised by developers.
- Building a new high school for Riverstone.
- I do not agree with any parking lot ideas that move Telfair out of Clements, Clements is not over-utilized.
- Just do the right thing for the District.
- Consider year-round programming to reduce utilization all elementary schools.
- Consider additions on the elementary schools to increase capacity then move 6th into elementaries to reduce middle school over utilization.




Range of Comments

- It is unequitable and unwise to spend tax dollars on converting Annex facilities as a temporary solution while there are other more viable, long term and more cost-effective options.
- I am against using sweet water admin building as the second campus of CWE because it will make some parents very inconvenient if they have to pick up different kids from different locations.
- Additions should be constructed on existing schools first.
- This just isn't a practical solution.
- Not only inconvenient but strange. I do not want to have to drop students off at more than one location.
- Don't send any students from Riverstone there.
- Copy paste below content for Question 5 We do not support any rezoning of Commonwealth ES or Settlers Way ES.
- Dividing the school teachers and students into two locations will reduce interaction between the two groups and doubling unnecessary school staffs. In addition, the traffic at Sweetwater Blvd is already high due to St. Laurence Catholic school so having Administration Annex converted into K-1 facility will only make it worse.
- Due to rezoning our kids will have to suffer and property value of riverstone community will go down and it could also incur assets value loss or devaluation of the property. If this happen then we don't want to pay more taxes to the city.
- I need more information on this idea.
- If FBISD caves to whining by Riverstone and this is the only option for older, less combative communities within 3 miles of CWE, CME, CBE and FSMS, FCMS, then OK.

- Consider the Annex as a 9th grade center for Clements.
- Consider building a new middle school in the area and change the grade configuration to 5-8 to relieve all elementary schools without rezoning.
- Tear down the annex and construct a new school for the area.
- Create a district-wide tech center here.
- Put an addition onto Commonwealth ES.





Range of Comments

- Changing Fort Settlement Feeder Options may have the unintended consequence of actually unbalancing the successful program now existing at Fort Settlement. There is no point in trying to solve one problem by probably creating another.
- First Colony is one of the older middle schools in FBISD and would benefit from any and all upgrades in the structure. As far as the rezoning to balance populations at FC and FS, it's inevitable. I would just ask that the lines make sense, distance wise and are done as soon as possible as my kids are quickly approaching that age and would love to have this settled before they start. Every parent's want is to have their kids start and continue through the same middle school or high schools without interruption. Those years are the ones that need the most stability.
- Follow the fairest way to rezone if unavoidable! Last in, first out! Keep district's historical feeder pattern, such as CME-FSMS-CHS.
- Do not rezone and students south of TX-6 (Riverstone) to schools north of TX-6, Quail Valley, Lake-O.
- FSMS overcapacity issue needs to be addressed now. It will only get worse based on the data provided by district.
- Since enrollment will decrease over the next years to a projected 82%, we do not see any reason for the addition to be built to First Colony MS.
- It is better to have additional new construction to some existing school rather than putting more finance into completely new building.
- It is the best solution, It will resolve the problems permanently.
- Last in, first out.
- This seems like a good idea as long as it does not include wholesale rezoning of Colony Meadows into a feeder school for First Colony Middle School. My primary concern is the fact that a group of Riverstone residents are suggesting that Colony Meadows Elementary should feed into First Colony Middle School rather than Fort Settlement Middle School. This seems ABSURD for a variety reasons. This must not occur.
- We do not support ANY rezoning between First Colony MS and Fort Settlement MS

Additional Ideas (from the Parking Lots)

- Consider Annex as a stand alone GT Academy, this will likely reduce enrollment at Fort Settlement and eliminate the need for rezoning.
- Consider Aligning Telfair back to Kempner to relieve Clements - do not agree. Telfair high school students should remain zoned to Clements.
- Consider an addition to Fort Settlement MS to accommodate Riverstone.
- Consider rezoning part of Sullivan to First Colony MS or Quail Valley MS or Lake Olympia MS to free up space at Fort Settlement MS.
- Create AM & PM shifts at Fort Settlement to address overcrowding.
- Consider renovating Commonwealth to accommodate 6th graders.
- Consider moving the Gifted and Talented Program at Quail Valley MS to another under-utilized Middle School. Rezone to balance enrollment between Fort Settlement, First Colony, and Quail Valley (Also see Elkins Feeder Pattern).
- Consider using UH-Fort Bend facility to relieve Clements and Fort Settlement.
- Create stand-alone GT Academy at QVMS to help move students from over utilized middle schools. Non-GT students currently at QVMS should feed to under-utilized middle schools such as Dulles MS and Lake Olympia MS.
- Colony Meadows ES students should feed into First Colony MS (lower utilization) in order to increase utilization at First Colony MS. Anne Sullivan ES and Commonwealth ES should continue to feed Fort Settlement MS.
- I suggest to divide and rezone part of the current FSMS attendees who are from Riverstone to FCMS.
- Riverstone is too big a community to fit into any single middle school that's already used by other communities. FBISD needs to build a new middle school for Riverstone residents and there is no doubt about the urgency for doing this.

- As a alumni from hunters glen, Missouri city, and Thurgood Marshall, I do not support this proposed plan. I am a successful doctor of physical therapy and I have graduated directly from the schools that are being targeted. I believe these schools are community supported and strive for greatness. I believe that I'm order to help solve these issues of underuse and over use, the district should stop building new schools(to save money) and properly utilize what we have by rezoning(like it was done in 1999 and 2003 with Hightower and Marshall). With the rezoning plan, it will give every campus an opportunity to be diverse in all aspects to represent the district well in both academics, sports, and community participation.
- As a FBISD tax payer, it is hard for me to see multiple schools in close proximity with low utilization percentages. There are fixed cost such as utilities, admin staff, cafeteria staff, counselors, nurses, custodial staff, etc. that each school requires to operate on a daily basis. Although I know that there are emotional connections to each campus, I think that the district needs to look at the best use of it's budget. Closing campuses to achieve the 80-120% utilization should be the goal. The cost savings could potentially be used to help pay for new programming or more support services to help low performing schools increase reading comprehension at a younger age.
- There is no reason to close Hunters Glen. Many kids in my neighborhood walk to that school as it's only a few minutes away. Moving kids to another school, such as EA Jones, would make no sense and would make it more difficult to get them to school if they have to walk.
- I know the schools are underused, but having taught in this area of Fort Bend ISD for 29 years, I feel it is VERY necessary to lower the class sizes and have smaller classes. The behavior in the school can be a problem and I feel an elementary behavior school could help on the East side of FBISD. Maybe it would be wise to have a primary center for pre k and kindergarten students from the area to attend, use a school for grades 1-3, a grade 4-5 school, a grade 6-8school, then a junior high and high school. I have lived in a state and city that did this and it worked very well.
- I understand that the area feeding into Marshall struggles with enrollment, but I believe that implementing a system that calls for rezoning and redefining boundary lines to effectively feed into those elementary schools and implementing mandatory zoning should be considered before closing Hunters Glen Elementary. For an example, consider having Quail Run students going to Hunters Glen Elementary.



Range of Comments




Range of Comments

Range of Comments

- First, it would send a message to our community that our neighborhoods aren't worth rebuilding in. Our students would have to be bused away from their neighborhood to a brand new school built in a neighborhood that has made it very clear that they do not want to partner with us. Shadow Creek has very vocally and publicly attempted to leave FBISD, and said disparaging things about our students and our community. Secondly, this option would take over 1,000 students with high academic, social, and emotional needs from three different neighborhoods and place them all in one building. If FBISD truly wants to INSPIRE and EQUIP our students for the future they will invest in our neighborhood rather than tear it down and bus the students out. Already we are short staffed and do not have the resources to meet our students needs. We need social workers assigned full-time to only one campus. We need to partner with mental health providers to get counseling into our schools. We need more support for our teachers in regards to classroom management and educating traumatized children. An area like ours desperately needs thriving elementary schools to act as bedrocks of growth and hope for the community. If FBISD truly wants to INSPIRE and EQUIP our students for the future they will invest in our neighborhood rather than tear it down and bus the students out.
- I support community schools that serves the clients who live in them. I do not think this plan best serves the students or their caregivers.
- People will not support closing 3 schools to turn around and build a new ne! That doesn't make sense and s not fiscally responsible.
- the new facility will be too far the neighborhoods that Ridgemont, Ridgeway, Blue Ridge, and Briargate currently serve. This will be a huge inconvenience for parents as well as the young children who are currently able to walk to and from school. I'm not sure what the repurpose would be, however I do know that abandoned school buildings in that area would bring more drugs, violence, crime, graffiti, and gangs to the area. This area has already grown past that and has significantly improved since the 90's.
- This seems like a great way to address Pre-K - 2nd grade literacy proficiency. It also keeps the students from this entire attendance zone together through graduation.
- Too many schools to shut doors. We may need those seats. Why not look to Dr. Dupre's "innovative programming" to keep schools populated? A fine arts elementary academy/Montessori style elementary/ELL school. Find a way to use the buildings we have to provide services and benefits and value to our kids. On a district wide level we need elementary seats. The optics and costs of building new while shutting down old is all kinds of off-putting.

Additional Ideas (from the Parking Lots)

- Rebuild Blue Ridge and open it to the community
- Close Blue Ridge and send students to Ridgeway and Ridgemont. Make Blue Ridge the PPCD program/ECI/Alternative program for ES Special Needs. Turn into special needs school for this region - Flash/Sails/PPCD/Pre-K this will provide an opportunity for staff to become innovative with our rising autism population. You have classroom nurses that can provide care to multiple students. Housing in one building will allow for these programs to have staff support to achieve greatness and provide those needs for those kids.
- Create a dedicated school, or school within a school, to house special education programs at an underutilized school (Blue Ridge).
- I am wondering if it would be possible to consolidate the middle School and high school in the willowridge zone. That way students could stay in their geographic area and not have their high schools closed. Of course efforts would be necessary to ensure there is not an inappropriate level of mixing between the middle School and high school students. This could also be an option for the Marshall zone.
- Use the Pk-1 campus and use the other 2 as 2-5 campuses or maybe even a 5-6th grade campus. Give these schools the same level of renovations that Dulles, Quail Valley ES, and EA Jones went through.


Range of Comments

Additional Ideas (from the Parking Lots)

- Moderate renovations at all four campus
- Pilot a Pk-1 program at one of the campuses and allow parents to opt in to the program. Rebuild Blue Ridge large enough to house the program within it
- Rezoning will have to be addressed to tackle the enrollment issues across the district. As well as, transfers should be allowed to all tax payers. Vouchers should be opened to students and parents. Additional Ideas (from the Parking Lots)

- Rezone all of New Territory to Austin.
- Rezone a portion of Elkins to Marshall, then rezone some of Ridge Point to Elkins.
- Move Elkins zoning toward Marshall.
- Rezone part of the upper-left corner of the Ridge Point area to Hightower/Elkins.
- Make Marshall an early college school and move Willowridge kids to Hightower. Rezone new neighborhood kids around Ridge Point to Marshall.
- Domino effect from Ridge Point to Marshall.
- Set up new academies that would attract students to schools in need of student growth such as Marshall.
- Start re-zoning from West and South sides of Fort Bend school zones, relieving pressure from Eastern zones.
- Tear down & repurpose Lakeview, renovate Sugar Mill and adjust Lakeview's feeder pattern.
- Move the people who are in the corners and zone them to different schools.
- Move math and science academy to Marshall. Rezone Dulles into Elkins and rezone Elkins into Ridge Point.
- Build a middle school for Hightower which is solely zoned there.
- Add new programs to Marshall and remove some of Elkins to Marshall and Ridge Point to Hightower.
- Build another high school in the Ridge Point high school zone.
- The neighborhoods close to Elkins that are zoned to Ridge Point should be rezoned.
- Move Ridge Point and Elkins students to Hightower. Move the medical academy to Willowridge high school. Three academies are moved to Marshall, and three are moved to Dulles. Part of Dulles is rezoned to Kempner.
- Rezone a portion of Elkins (North of TX-6) to Willowridge and Marshall. Then distribute a portion of Ridge Point to Elkins and Hightower
- Try to make Willowridge and Marshall 6A.
- Add academy, revive, and acknowledge why WHS & MHS are underutilized.
- Combine Willowridge and Marshall and keep the extra building there used as a tech ed center until population grows. Use that money to build a new high school in Commonwealth/Ridge Point area.
- Make a GT high school/early college prep HS.
- Do not make a 9th grade center or split grades.
