BACKGROUND

- Why This Topic
 - Support does not mean helicopter, we need to learn the difference.
 - GT kids tend to have social-emotional struggles in addition to academic challenges.
 - The earlier we can help kids learn to communicate effectively, the better off they will be long term.

How to start at home

- Model good communication when you have opportunities
 - When there is a dispute between family members, show them how they can discuss problems without escalation. This includes disputes between adults.
- Help them figure out their feelings
 - How does something impact them?
 - What are they worried about?
 - What is their best/worst case scenario?
- It is always better for kids to focus on their feelings as opposed to their perceived injustice
 - Better to say, "I feel frustrated" than "You did something that wasn't fair!"

PARENT PROBLEM OR KID PROBLEM

- Short Term Problems are Kid Problems
 - Homework questions
 - Confusion about a topic
 - Question about a specific grade
 - Technical difficulties
- Long Term Problems or System Issues are Parent Problems
 - Declining homework
 - Chronic grading issues
 - Long term communication issues
 - Concerns related to school operation generally

THE LITTLE ONES- K TO GRADE 2

- Basic Principles to Start Applying Now
 - Encourage them to express their feelings
 - I feel statements are the fastest way for them to make their needs clear
 - Help them learn that we communicate with different people in different ways
 - How we talk to family is different than how we talk to teachers
 - They need to be calm and not yell
 - They need to address their assigned adults appropriately
 - Make sure they understand that if they are polite, they can make progress by saying things like,
 - I'm bored
 - This is too easy for me
 - Is there something else I can do

The Less Little Ones- Grades 3 & Up

- Everything the little kids can do, the big kids should do
- By grade 2/3, kids should be able to handle day to day issues on their own
- Timing
 - Can this wait until after class, or is it an immediate need?
- The Communication Itself
 - Kids should be polite and specific. Don't say, "I don't understand the homework." Specificity means being clear, "In question 5, I don't understand what you are looking for."
 - Encourage them to say what they want. I'm not getting what I need, and this is what I think would help.
- Make it 100% clear to them that if they are unable to get resolution, you will help them.

Conclusion

- Teaching kids to communicate now will serve them throughout their lives.
- Successful communication makes them seem responsible, invested, and capable.
- Some teachers are more responsive to kids.
- The expectation for communication is low at the elementary level. It is the perfect time for them to practice and get stronger before the stakes escalate.
- When they successfully communicate with an adult, and it works, it gives them confidence that will make them more willing to advocate for themselves in the future.
