### Summer 2020 Reading Guidelines for 6th Graders Attending the Fort Bend GT Academy

In a 2009 government web cast, Secretary of Education Arne Duncan described summer learning loss as "devastating." This is what researchers have often referred to as the "summer slide." It is estimated that school summer breaks will cause the average student to lose up to one month of instruction, with disadvantaged students being disproportionately affected (Cooper, 1996).


### Directions for Mysterious Benedict Society

**Directions:** As you are reading the novel, use the following list of characters from the book to create a mind-map that shows the connections amongst the characters from the book:

- 1. Create your Mind Map on an 11 x 17 inch sheet of paper. It is okay to tape two regular size sheets of paper together side by side.
- 2. Start with Reynie in the middle.
- 3. You may hand draw your mind map or create a digital product using one of many free online mind mapping programs or Microsoft tools like Word or PowerPoint.
- 4. Remember, when a character interacts with another character in the novel, you should show a connection between the two. You may want to show different types of lines or use different colors for direct and indirect connections.
  - a. If one character directly talks to another character then they have a solid line between them
  - b. If it is mentioned in the novel that two characters are connected but not directly shown, then you might use a dashed line between them
- 5. Between the connections, write a statement explaining the event that brought the two characters together in the novel. To show the direction in which the connection needs to be read.



### **Directions for Organization Book**

Read the book you chose and talk with your parents about the structures and routines you plan to use to hold yourself accountable for the new responsibilities you are about to take on. Middle school is much different from elementary and having systems in place to support you will make the transition easier.

### **Directions for Free Choice Novel**

Students will keep an annotated journal of your thinking as you read your free choice novel. You should have 20 - 25 total annotations. Your notes should focus on the following concepts from fifth grade:

incidents that advance the story or novel, explaining how each incident gives rise to or foreshadows future events;

explain the roles and functions of characters in various plots, including their relationships and conflicts

Students will use their notes to demonstrate their understanding of the novel during the beginning of the Fall semester.

This is an example of how to set up your dialectical journal.

Quote, Author and Page Number from the Novel	How does this incident lead to the next event in the story or How do the characters actions/reactions lead to either conflict or resolution of conflict?
"A buzzer sounded in George's head. His thoughts fled in panic, like bandit's from a burglar alarm. (Vonnegut, 1)	(Incident in the story example) This incident introduces the reader to the challenges citizens face in this story. Each person lives under constant surveillance and lacks the freedom to make their own choices.
"Who knows better than I do what normal is?" said Hazel. (Vonnegut, 2)	(Character relationships and conflicts example) Hazel is very happy to be ignorant of what is going on around her. She does not want to know the truth and this will later be a challenge to helping the society make changes.
