Set goals to increase the number and celebrate when you do. Take into account work responsibilities, summer activities, and family events. <ul> <li>Follow a protocol—have the child read their writing aloud</li> </ul>	
to you while you simply listen. Have them read it again,	
and this time, take notes on things you here. You might	
listen for things that stand out to you like vivid images or	
strong word choice, details you want to know more about,	
or emotions the writing creates for you. You can ask you	
writer, "What are you working on that I can listen for?" or	
"What would you like me to give you feedback on?"
